GTAC MINE MOVING FORWARD

Hundreds of Jobs for Heartland Broadcast Area

The \$1.5 billion Gogebic Taconite Mine (GTAC) experienced a temporary slowdown as masked eco terrorists trespassed and attacked the drill site area threatening and injuring GTAC employees and damaging equipment and property. Felony charges have been filed against the certain eco terrorists involved.

Following the attacks by eco terrorists, GTAC was forced to hire professional security guards to replace local Iron County law enforcement because local law enforcement officials were stretched thin due to the July 4th holiday activities.

According to GTAC spokesperson Bob Seitz, the security guards from a Scottsdale, Arizona company, Bulletproof Securities "did a great job out there... we have a safe work site." The guards were hired due to prior threats and violence caused by eco terrorists who mostly belong to organizations outside of Ashland and Iron Counties. At this writing, the guards were temporarily pulled from the site pending proper state licensing. According to Tom Parrella, the president of the Arizona security company, they had a three-hour notice to provide immediate security at the Wisconsin GTAC work site; they inadvertently neglected, due to time constraints, to obtain licensing. Seitz, in a statement made to the Wisconsin State Journal said that as soon as the state issues the permits, the guards would return.

EBITDA, Expenses and Revenues will be Main Topics

The Heartland Vice Presidents/General Managers will assemble at the corporate offices in Eagle River on Thursday, August 8, 2013 at 11:00 a.m. According to Heartland CEO, Jim Coursolle, "We, as a team, get together to discuss Heartland expenses, revenues and EBITDA during the afternoon of August 8, 2013." The meeting will set the stage for the remainder of 2013 and for

2014, the year ahead.

EBITDA is an accounting term acronym which represents: "Earnings Before Interest, Taxation, Depreciation and Amortization. EBITDA is a margin that companies and lenders use to measure progress and a company's ability to handle certain levels of debt load.

On July 4th morning, I was asked to do the Communion serviced at our local Catholic Church since the person who regularily does it had the day off. I had to write a homily (short presentation during the service). I went on-line to research some sites looking for a Fourth of July theme. "Catholic On-Line" had some relevant info and I'd like to share some of the thoughts with you along with a lot of my own.

As you know, in June of 1776, Thomas Jefferson brilliantly composed the first drafts of the Declaration of Independence. After some revision, the bulk of the document was approved by Congress on July 4, 1776. In the Ashland and Hurley area, the GTAC Mine is slated to provide 2000 initial construction jobs and then, when operational, 700 mining jobs with another 2000 ancillary jobs predicted. According to Heartland CEO Jim Coursolle, the GTAC Mine "is a once-ina-lifetime job opportunity for our Heartland service area in NW Wisconsin and we are grateful to GTAC president Bill Williams and the Cline Group for this mine."

In a recent letter to GTAC president Bill Williams from state legislators Sen. Bob Jauch (D-Poplar) and Rep. Janet Bewley (D-74th Assembly District), they stated: "We are calling on you to immediately remove the heavily armed masked commando security forces currently hired to protect your company's property in the Penokee Hills. The images are horrifying and the action by the company to hire this high security Arizona firm is appalling. These kinds of security forces are common in third world countries but they don't belong in Northern Wisconsin. We cannot begin to describe how upset the citizens of Northern Wisconsin are at the sight of our forests being patrolled by masked soldiers carrying military style assault weapons like mercenaries in a time of war."

Prior to March 2013 when Wisconsin Governor Scott Walker signed legislation allowing GTAC to proceed with their due diligence process, Heartland's Jim Coursolle broadcast several editorials on Heartland Ashland and Park Falls stations in favor of GTAC, stating that the mine was all about hundreds -- and with supporting employment thousands of jobs for one of the highest unemployment areas in Wisconsin. Coursolle told the HCGazette that he was seriously contemplating continuing his editorial remarks, but when he read the Jauch/Bewley letter to GTAC president Bill Williams, Coursolle said, "I couldn't have done a better job than Bob

Jauch and Janet Bewley did when alerting the people in the Ashland and Iron County area to the absurdity contained in their letter.

People are turned off by Bob Jauch and Janet Bewley because - please notice - they completely failed to condemn the eco terrorists assaulting GTAC employees and destroying property, yet Jauch and Bewley condemned GTAC for taking measures to protect its own employees and property. There is something very shallow and strange about the letter Jauch and Bewley wrote; the health and safety of GTAC employees is certainly the most important priority here."

In a sternly worded statement made July 12, 1013, Gov. Scott Walker demanded that eco-terrorists disrupting the preliminary work at the proposed GTAC Mine be held accountable for their actions according to a story in the *Wisconsin Reporter*. Walker said,

"These extremists – who are disrupting work and causing harm to law-abiding employees – should be prosecuted to the fullest extent of the law." The Governor also said, "I appreciate the efforts of law enforcement in the area and spoke with the Iron County Sheriff to offer any assistance that may be needed going forward. The laws of Wisconsin will be upheld."

On June 20, 2013, the Ashland County Commissioners passed a zoning ordinance that would require GTAC or any applicant to pay to the county \$100,000 for a special use permit. If the special use permit account would dip below \$50,000 dollars, additional monies would be required to be paid by GTAC or any applicant. At this point, GTAC has said they will not apply for the special use permit and will probably locate the GTAC mine entirely in Iron County causing Ashland County to lose significant tax revenue. The Iron County government has been much more reasonable and favorable to the significant job opportunity created by the proposed GTAC Mine.

Coursolle said that as Heartland begins to explore ways to expand its ownership of radio stations in NW Wisconsin and the UP of Michigan, Heartland, and all management level employees, will need to strategize ways to raise EBITDA levels by a combination of reducing expenses and raising revenues. He said, "I have asked both Kathy Wawiorka, Heartland Corporate Business Manager and Deb Josephs, Heartland CFO to assist me in scrutinizing all company expenses. Lenders look at EBITDA margins very closely and so will the Heartland management team going forward.

'Economies of scale' or more stations adding to revenue production and the sharing in expense payment as illustrated by our most profitable four station Ashland market, makes financial sense to the growth and future of this company."
